"They were taking them back to Tennessee," Gragg said, "They have shell companies there that buy them and ship them overseas."

Authorities said black-market mussels often are shipped to Japan or Indonesia where they are used in making cultured pearls, buttons or cosmetics. For cultured pearls, a plug is cut from the mussel and implanted in an oyster. Within two years, a cultured pearl is formed.


